**SUMMARY STATEMENT**

**Introduction**

This agenda bill is returning to the City Council for endorsement of the Issaquah Police Accountability, Equity and Human Services Action Plan (Exhibit A). See the Update section for additional information.

~~This agenda bill requests that the City Council receive and provide feedback on the draft Issaquah Police Accountability, Equity and Human Services Action Plan; and, direct the Administration to return with a final version for endorsement by the City Council at a Special Council meeting on Aug. 10, 2020.~~

**Background**

Following the tragic death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, people across our country – including on the steps of Issaquah City Hall – have rightfully demonstrated against racial injustice throughout our country. The Black Lives Matters demonstrators have asked that we take this moment to talk about what we need to do as a community to recognize racial bias, and make changes to eliminate the disproportionate damage it is doing to community members of color.

In response, at the June 15 City Council meeting, the City provided an overview of City training, procedures and programs focused on racial equity with a specific emphasis on the Issaquah Police Department and Municipal Court, and the City Council provided feedback. Also at that meeting, public comments were heard urging police reforms.

**Proposal**

In response to public and Council input, the Administration has prepared an Issaquah Police Accountability, Equity and Human Services Action Plan to address enhanced police accountability, equity initiatives and human services programs in Issaquah over the next eighteen months (Exhibit A).

The Plan is broken up into short (completion by Aug. 31, 2020), medium (completion by Dec. 31, 2020) and long term (completion in 2021) items.

This draft Plan will be presented to the City Council at the June 29 Special Council meeting for initial review and feedback.

Also on June 29, Police Chief Behrbaum will answer questions raised at the June 15 City Council meeting (Exhibit B) and walk the City Council through the City's current use of force policies compared with model established by #8CANTWAIT initiative (Exhibit C). The presentation is attached as Exhibit D.

**Public Engagement**

During July, the Mayor and Police Chief will present this draft Plan for feedback and comment to the Issaquah Equity and Inclusion Community Forum as well as hold a general community meeting for feedback and comment.

**Next Steps**

The Administration requests Council direction to return with the Action Plan at a Special Council meeting on Aug. 10 for final review and endorsement.

### **Financial Information**

Costs associated with this Action Plan will be identified as each initiative is more further developed.

### **Update**

At the June 29, 2020 Special Council meeting, ten individuals made verbal comments regarding police funding and policies. City Administrator Bobkiewicz then presented the draft plan and Police Chief Behrbaum provided a comparison of the City's current police policies in comparison to the 8CANTWAIT initiative.

The City Council provided input on the draft plan and passed a motion receiving the draft plan and directing the Administration to bring forward the final plan for endorsement at an Aug. 10 Special Council meeting.

The draft plan has been updated as shown in updated Exhibit A to reflect comments received at two community meetings held during July. At Monday's Special Council meeting, City Administrator Bobkiewicz will present the final plan and seek Council endorsement of the plan.

**ISSAQUAH POLICE ACCOUNTABILITY, EQUITY AND HUMAN SERVICES ACTION PLAN**  
**DRAFT – AUGUST 11, 2020** ~~JUNE 26, 2020~~

Mayor Mary Lou Pauly and the Issaquah City Council are dedicated to fostering a safe, vibrant, livable, and inclusive community through effective stewardship and quality public services. This Action Plan is our commitment to moving the City of Issaquah forward in providing greater police accountability, equity in all our services and human services programs that better serve our community. Each of the plan's actions are focused on transparency, public trust, accountability, partnerships and equity.

**SHORT TERM – BY AUGUST 31, 2020**

1. Review and Modifications of IPD Use of Force Policy: The current Police Department use of force policy will be evaluated compared to the #8CANTWAIT model policy and terms of model policy will be incorporated into IPD policy after consultation with the community.
2. Police Department Reporting: The Department will develop a monthly report that will be available to the public by email and posted on the City's website containing information on calls for service, types of calls responded, uses of force and other indicators. This monthly report will be augmented with additional reporting tools over time.
3. City Council Equity Training: The City Council will participate in an initial equity training class as a group. After initial class, the City Council will determine appropriate next training opportunities.
4. Action Plan Reporting: The City will produce a quarterly report updating the implementation of this Action Plan through December 31, 2021. The report will be posted on the City's website.

**MEDIUM TERM – BY DECEMBER 31, 2020**

1. Police Department Budget and Operations Review: City Administration will conduct a review of the Police Department's budget and operations. Initial Recommendations from this review will be included in the Proposed FY 2021 budget to be presented to the City Council in late September 2020. The review will continue through 2021 and additional recommendations are anticipated for the FY 2022 budget.

This review will include all functions but will focus on how best to incorporate dedicated professional mental and behavioral health professionals into day to day department operations. In addition, other areas to be evaluated will include current community policing strategies, introduction of body cameras, review of equipment purchases and review of jail operations.

The Administration will seek input from the public in a variety of ways on specific proposals as the review occurs. prior to release of FY 2021 budget. In addition, an employee committee at the Police Department will be formed to solicit suggestions for identifying and implementing identified initial changes proposed in FY 2021 and continuing through preparation of FY 2022 budget.

2. Police Department Use of Force Review and Reporting: The department will evaluate its existing use of force review policy and reporting of cases. Information would be shared regularly with the public.
3. Police Department Complaint Process – Informal and Formal: The department will review its current informal and formal complaint processes and implement new systems to better track complaints and standardize investigative processes.
- ~~4. Review of Police Department Training Programs: The Administration will review all current department training programs and report to the City Council and community with details of programs and recommendations for improvements.~~
4. Police Department Equity Training: The department will budget and schedule eight hours of equity training for all department staff specific to police operations. This would be in addition to department staff participating in citywide training scheduled for all city employees.
5. Review of Police Department Recruitment and Hiring/Role of Civil Service Commission: The Administration and Human Resources Department will begin review of current Police Department recruiting practices and examine role of Civil Service Commission in ensuring diverse candidate pool for police officers.
- ~~5-6. Police Department Data Collection and Reporting: The department will review its current processes for data collection and investigate ways to be better share this data in the future. Data will include types of calls for services and demographics of contacts with the community.~~
- ~~6-7. Use of School Resources Officers: The City and Issaquah School District will evaluate current use of police officers in schools.~~
- ~~7-8. City Council/Police Department Information Sharing: The Administration will work with the City Council and Police administration to schedule opportunities for members of the City Council to learn more firsthand about Police Department operations.~~
- ~~8-9. Develop and Begin Implementation of Citywide Equity Training Curriculum: The City's Equity Team will develop and begin implementation of a multi-course training curriculum for all City employees on issues of racial equity. This curriculum will include both in person and online training. City staff will be divided into inter-departmental cohorts to complete the training. It is anticipated that the initial training curriculum would be completed by the end of 2021. In addition, the Equity Team is recommending a separate training specifically for managers and supervisors in addition to citywide training.~~
- ~~9. Broaden Scope of the City's Human Services Commission: The Human Services Commission would be charged with evaluating its current scope of responsibilities and making recommendations to the City Council for changes. The Commission would be asked to consider broadening its annual workplan to provide a guide for use of staff resources for human services initiatives. Broadening the scope of the Human Services Commission will include review of its membership and bylaws to ensure residents with lived experience of non-inclusion and/or discrimination are included in a meaningful way. Public input and feedback will be obtained throughout the Commission's restructuring and re-evaluation process. The Commission would~~

~~also be charged to receive updates on implementation of the Equity and Human Services Action Plan.~~

10. Evaluate Resident Review of Equity and Human Services Initiatives: The Human Services Commission would be charged with evaluating current resident review of the City's equity and human services initiatives and make recommendations to the Mayor and City Council on best next steps. This may include changes to the current scope of work of the Human Services Commission, changes to the scope of work of other City boards and commissions, the creation of an additional City board or commission to address these matters and/or collaboration with other existing community organizations.

~~10-11. Review Citywide Human Services Staffing/Contracting Resources: The Administration will review allocation of staff and contracting resources to support Human Services activities in its proposed FY 2021 budget. This would include review of existing resources in all departments (as well as support from Eastside Fire and Rescue) and identify any additions of reallocations moving forward.~~

#### LONG TERM – 2021

~~1. Review of Police Department Recruitment and Hiring/Role of Civil Service Commission: The Administration and Human Resources Department will review current Police Department recruiting practices and examine role of Civil Service Commission in ensuring diverse candidate pool for police officers.~~

~~2-1. Review of Police Department Policies for Discipline and Termination: The Human Resources Department will review department policies and make recommendations to the Administration on potential revisions. These revisions will likely require negotiations with employee bargaining units.~~

2. Review of Police Department Training Programs: The Administration will review all current department training programs and report to the City Council and community with details of programs and recommendations for improvement.

3. Consider Police Review Community Board or Commission: The Administration will consider options for the creation of a board or commission comprised of community members charged with review of Police Department policies, procedures and/or complaints.

4. Creation of Police Department Data Dashboard: The Police Department will create a data dashboard presenting information on a variety of measurable outcomes.

5. Review Schedule of All Police Department Local Fines and Fees as well as Asset Seizure Policies: The department will conduct review and report to the City Council with recommendations for needed changes.

6. Develop a Racial Equity Toolkit: The Administration will work with the Equity Team to develop a Racial Equity Toolkit that will assist the City in evaluating programs and services using an Equity Lens in decision making.

7. Review of Citywide Policies and Procedures using the Racial Equity Toolkit: The Administration will work with the Equity Team to develop a process to begin review of policies and procedures in all City departments using the Racial Equity Toolkit.

The following memorandum contains the initial responses to Council questions from the June 15<sup>th</sup>, 2020 Council meeting on Racial Equity. The responses supplement the Mayor’s Issaquah Police Accountability, Equity and Human Services Action Plan presented to Council.

### **Request for information on department calls for service**

The police department provides a community dashboard for crime activity on the department website that enables community members to search for information related to their neighborhood. The department also provides a crime map showing locations and types of calls the department responds to.

The following table provides calls for service and traffic stops handled by IPD.

The police department responds to numerous types of calls for service throughout the community. They are a balance of criminal investigations and community caretaking.

Approximately **15-20% of calls result in being solely community caretaking actions**, although the initial information received could result in a criminal investigation or needed law enforcement actions. The types of calls requested by the community are as follows:

**Do we measure statistics on race regarding police interactions and arrests?**

The police department does not keep statistics on race regarding police interactions such as calls for service, traffic stops, or contacts. The department does collect statistics on race regarding arrests and review this during the annual Bias-Based Policing Review. Additionally, the Use of Force reporting does track statistics on race of individuals involved.

**Does IPD utilize asset seizure? Doe the police department keep those funds as a part of their budget?**

The Issaquah Police Department does utilize seizure of assets during some criminal cases. Washington State law allows for a law enforcement agency to seize assets directly associated with the commission of a crime. Per state law, any forfeiture from drug investigations may only be used for law enforcement purposes. Additionally, IPD Policy 606 Asset Forfeiture provides guidance on this issue. Since 2014, IPD has only conducted 3 seizures of property:

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### Overview

The following document provides comparison of current Issaquah Police Department policies to the 8CANTWAIT.ORG initiative referencing the need for restrictive use of force policies within police organizations. The following 8 policy areas promoted by 8CANTWAIT.ORG are identified as:

- Ban Chokeholds & Strangleholds
- Require De-escalation
- Require Warning Before Shooting
- Requires Exhaust All Alternatives Before Shooting
- Duty to Intervene
- Ban Shooting at Moving Vehicles
- Require Use of Force Continuum
- Require Comprehensive Reporting

Each section of the document will provide the supporting policies and sections that address each of the 8CANTWAIT initiatives.

### Policy Manual

The Issaquah Policy Manual is supported through Lexipol.com, a law enforcement best practices, model policy service, that provides policies and procedures that align with federal and state laws. The manual is updated regularly based on court decisions and new legislation. Police agencies have the ability to modify the provided policies to address community needs and department specific functions.

The policies provide specific guidance to employees on department expectations for responding to and managing calls, interacting with the community, and documentation of those interactions.

## **8CANTWAIT.ORG Initiatives Comparison to IPD Policy Manual**

### **Ban Chokeholds & Strangleholds**

In law enforcement this technique is called the vascular neck restraint, or carotid hold, and has been an approved technique to subdue violent individuals. Our department does not allow the use of these techniques or train our employees for their use. Additionally, in section 300.3.4 USE OF FORCE TO SEIZE EVIDENCE if a subject is attempting to swallow evidence officers are directed to “not intentionally use any technique that restricts blood flow to the head, restricts respiration or which create a reasonable likelihood that blood flow to the head or respiration would be restricted.”

### **Require De-Escalation, Requiring Exhaust All Alternatives Before Shooting, Require Use of Force Continuum**

These three aspects are covered within several policies throughout the manual and are applicable to how an officer responds to each call that may require de-escalation and require them to only use reasonable force while performing their duties. Several of the policies identify what technique is acceptable in certain circumstances, and what would not be acceptable. For example, certain techniques or tools should only be used in deadly force situations, while others should only be used when passive resistance is being used on the officer. Additionally, the policies also include considerations for the officer to evaluate continuously through each incident to determine if force should be used or another tactic should be utilized. Officers are trained on de-escalation options and techniques regularly for each of the tools, techniques and tactics they are trained on.

De-escalation is addressed in use of force policies, as well as several other policies related to community responses for service: 418 Emergency Detentions, 468 Civil Disputes and 469 Crisis Intervention Incidents. A key component is the consideration for an officer to passively monitor or take no action when responding to a mental health crisis. Officers are expected to consider multiple aspects and utilize de-escalation whenever possible.

Examples of each aspect of de-escalation, force alternatives and use of force continuum are found in excerpts from the policies identified below.

#### **300 USE OF FORCE**

##### **300.2 POLICY**

The use of force by law enforcement personnel is a matter of critical concern, both to the public and to the law enforcement community. Officers are involved on a daily basis in numerous and varied interactions and, when warranted, may use reasonable force in carrying out their duties. Officers must have an understanding of, and true appreciation for, their authority and limitations. This is especially true with respect to overcoming resistance while engaged in the performance of law enforcement duties. The Department recognizes and respects the value of all human life and dignity without prejudice to anyone. Vesting officers with the authority to use reasonable force and to protect the public welfare requires monitoring, evaluation and a careful balancing of all interests.

### 300.3 USE OF FORCE

Officers shall use only that amount of force that reasonably appears necessary given the facts and circumstances perceived by the officer at the time of the event to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose. The "reasonableness" of force will be judged from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene at the time of the incident. Any evaluation of reasonableness must allow for the fact that officers are often forced to make split-second decisions about the amount of force that reasonably appears necessary in a particular situation, with limited information and in circumstances that are tense, uncertain and rapidly evolving. Given that no policy can realistically predict every possible situation an officer might encounter, officers are entrusted to use well-reasoned discretion in determining the appropriate use of force in each incident.

#### 300.3.2 FACTORS USED TO DETERMINE THE REASONABLENESS OF FORCE

When determining whether to apply force and evaluating whether an officer has used reasonable force, a number of factors should be taken into consideration, as time and circumstances permit. These factors include but are not limited to:

- (a) Immediacy and severity of the threat to officers or others.
- (b) The conduct of the individual being confronted, as reasonably perceived by the officer at the time.
- (c) Officer/subject factors (age, size, relative strength, skill level, injuries sustained, level of exhaustion or fatigue, the number of officers available vs. subjects).
- (d) The effects of drugs or alcohol.
- (e) Subject's mental state or capacity.
- (f) Proximity of weapons or dangerous improvised devices.
- (g) The degree to which the subject has been effectively restrained and his/her ability to

resist despite being restrained.

(h) The availability of other options and their possible effectiveness.

(i) Seriousness of the suspected offense or reason for contact with the individual.

(j) Training and experience of the officer.

(k) Potential for injury to officers, suspects, and others.

(l) Whether the person appears to be resisting, attempting to evade arrest by flight or is attacking the officer.

(m) The risk and reasonably foreseeable consequences of escape.

(n) The apparent need for immediate control of the subject or a prompt resolution of the situation.

(o) Whether the conduct of the individual being confronted no longer reasonably appears to pose an imminent threat to the officer or others.

(p) Prior contacts with the subject or awareness of any propensity for violence.

(q) Any other exigent circumstances.

#### 300.3.3 PAIN COMPLIANCE TECHNIQUES

Pain compliance techniques may be effective in controlling a physically or actively resisting individual. Officers may only apply those pain compliance techniques for which they have successfully completed department-approved training. Officers utilizing any pain compliance technique should consider:

(a) The degree to which the application of the technique may be controlled given the level of resistance.

(b) Whether the person can comply with the direction or orders of the officer.

(c) Whether the person has been given sufficient opportunity to comply.

The application of any pain compliance technique shall be discontinued once the officer determines that compliance has been achieved.

#### 308 CONTROL DEVICES AND TECHNIQUES

In order to control subjects who are violent or who demonstrate the intent to be violent, the Issaquah Police Department authorizes officers to use control devices in accordance with the guidelines in this policy and the Use of Force Policy.

### 308.5 BATON GUIDELINES

The need to immediately control a suspect must be weighed against the risk of causing serious injury. The head, neck, throat, spine, heart, kidneys and groin should not be intentionally targeted except when the officer reasonably believes the suspect poses an imminent threat of serious bodily injury or death to the officer or others.

### 308.6 TEAR GAS GUIDELINES

Tear gas may be used for crowd control, crowd dispersal or against barricaded suspects based on the circumstances. Only the Shift Supervisor, Incident Commander or Special Operations Team Commander may authorize the delivery and use of tear gas, and only after evaluating all conditions known at the time and determining that such force reasonably appears justified and necessary.

When practicable, fire personnel should be alerted or summoned to the scene prior to the deployment of tear gas to control any fires and to assist in providing medical aid or gas evacuation if needed.

### 308.7 OLEORESIN CAPSICUM (OC) GUIDELINES

As with other control devices, oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray and pepper projectiles may be considered for use to bring under control an individual or groups of individuals who are engaging in, or are about to engage in violent behavior. Pepper projectiles and OC spray should not, however, be used against individuals or groups who merely fail to disperse or do not reasonably appear to present a risk to the safety of officers or the public.

#### 308.7.2 PEPPER PROJECTILE SYSTEMS

Pepper projectiles are plastic spheres that are filled with a derivative of OC powder. Because the compressed gas launcher delivers the projectiles with enough force to burst the projectiles on impact and release the OC powder, the potential exists for the projectiles to inflict injury if they strike the head, neck, spine or groin. Therefore, personnel using a pepper projectile system should not intentionally target those areas, except when the officer reasonably believes the suspect poses an imminent threat of serious bodily injury or death to the officer or others.

### 308.9 NOISE FLASH DIVERSIONARY DEVICES

This department is committed to reducing the potential for violent confrontations when suspects are encountered. Noise Flash Diversionary Devices, when used properly, are less likely to result in death or serious physical injury. Noise Flash Diversionary Devices are approved by the Department and can be used in an attempt to deescalate a potentially deadly situation, with a reduced potential for death or serious physical injury.

#### 308.9.2 DEPLOYMENT

Generally, noise / flash diversionary devices may be considered whenever the use of a less-lethal diversion would facilitate entry, enable arrest and potentially reduce the risk of injury. The use of noise/flash diversionary devices requires an evaluation of the circumstances of the incident. They should only be used after a determination that lesser force may not be effective and that their use would likely enhance officer safety and increase the likelihood of the safe control of the suspect(s).

#### 308.9.3 EXAMPLES OF CIRCUMSTANCES APPROPRIATE FOR DEPLOYMENT

Listed are some examples of situations where deployment of the noise / flash diversionary device might be deployed.

- (a) Barricaded suspect and / or hostage situations.
- (b) High risk warrant services.
- (c) Circumstances wherein distraction of violent mentally deranged persons or those under the influence of alcohol / drugs is believed necessary in order to facilitate apprehension.
- (d) Situations wherein the authorizing person deems their use necessary to safely resolve the incident.

#### 308.9.4 DEPLOYMENT CONSIDERATIONS

Before deploying noise / flash diversionary devices, the officer should consider the following factors:

- (a) Potential presence of children and elderly / disabled persons;
- (b) Ability to deploy to an area visible to the deploying officer;
- (c) Potential presence of flammable or explosive materials; and
- (d) Access to portable fire extinguisher.

#### 308.10 KINETIC ENERGY PROJECTILE GUIDELINES

This department is committed to reducing the potential for violent confrontations. Kinetic energy projectiles, when used properly, are less likely to result in death or serious physical injury and can be used in an attempt to de-escalate a potentially deadly situation.

##### 308.10.1 DEPLOYMENT AND USE

Only department-approved kinetic energy munitions shall be carried and deployed. Approved munitions may be used to compel an individual to cease his/her actions when such munitions present a reasonable option. Officers are not required or compelled to use approved munitions in lieu of other reasonable tactics if the involved officer determines that deployment of these

munitions cannot be done safely. The safety of hostages, innocent persons and officers takes priority over the safety of subjects engaged in criminal or suicidal behavior.

Circumstances appropriate for deployment include, but are not limited to, situations in which:

- (a) The suspect is armed with a weapon and the tactical circumstances allow for the safe application of approved munitions.
- (b) The suspect has made credible threats to harm him/herself or others.
- (c) The suspect is engaged in riotous behavior or is throwing rocks, bottles or other dangerous projectiles at people and/or officers.
- (d) There is probable cause to believe that the suspect has already committed a crime of violence and is refusing to comply with lawful orders.

#### 308.10.2 DEPLOYMENT CONSIDERATIONS

Before discharging projectiles, the officer should consider such factors as:

- (a) Distance and angle to target.
- (b) Type of munitions employed.
- (c) Type and thickness of subject's clothing.
- (d) The subject's proximity to others.
- (e) The location of the subject.
- (f) Whether the subject's actions dictate the need for an immediate response and the use of control devices appears appropriate.

A verbal warning of the intended use of the device should precede its application, unless it would otherwise endanger the safety of officers or when it is not practicable due to the circumstances. The purpose of the warning is to give the individual a reasonable opportunity to voluntarily comply and to warn other officers and individuals that the device is being deployed.

Officers should keep in mind the manufacturer's recommendations and their training regarding effective distances and target areas. However, officers are not restricted solely to use according to manufacturer recommendations. Each situation must be evaluated on the totality of circumstances at the time of deployment.

The need to immediately incapacitate the subject must be weighed against the risk of causing serious injury or death. The head and neck should not be intentionally targeted, except when the officer reasonably believes the suspect poses an imminent threat of serious bodily injury or death to the officer or others.

### 309 CONDUCTED ENERGY DEVICE

#### 309.2 POLICY

The TASER device is intended to control a violent or potentially violent individual, while minimizing the risk of serious injury. The appropriate use of such a device should result in fewer serious injuries to officers and suspects.

#### 309.4 VERBAL AND VISUAL WARNINGS

A verbal warning of the intended use of the TASER device should precede its application, unless it would otherwise endanger the safety of officers or when it is not practicable due to the circumstances. The purpose of the warning is to:

- (a) Provide the individual with a reasonable opportunity to voluntarily comply.
- (b) Provide other officers and individuals with a warning that the TASER device may be deployed.

If, after a verbal warning, an individual is unwilling to voluntarily comply with an officer's lawful orders and it appears both reasonable and feasible under the circumstances, the officer may, but is not required to, display the electrical arc (provided that a cartridge has not been loaded into the device), or the laser in a further attempt to gain compliance prior to the application of the TASER device. The aiming laser should never be intentionally directed into the eyes of another as it may permanently impair his/her vision.

The fact that a verbal or other warning was given or the reasons it was not given shall be documented by the officer deploying the TASER device in the related report.

#### 309.5 USE OF THE TASER DEVICE

The TASER device has limitations and restrictions requiring consideration before its use. The TASER device should only be used when its operator can safely approach the subject within the operational range of the device. Although the TASER device is generally effective in controlling most individuals, officers should be aware that the device may not achieve the intended results and be prepared with other options.

##### 309.5.1 APPLICATION OF THE TASER DEVICE

The TASER device may be used in any of the following circumstances, when the circumstances perceived by the officer at the time indicate that such application is reasonably necessary to control a person:

- (a) The subject is violent or is physically resisting.
- (b) The subject has demonstrated, by words or action, an intention to be violent or to physically resist, and reasonably appears to present the potential to harm officers, him/herself or others.

Mere flight from a pursuing officer, without other known circumstances or factors, is not good cause for the use of the TASER device to apprehend an individual.

#### 309.5.2 SPECIAL DEPLOYMENT CONSIDERATIONS

The use of the TASER device on certain individuals should generally be avoided unless the totality of the circumstances indicates that other available options reasonably appear ineffective or would present a greater danger to the officer, the subject or others, and the officer reasonably believes that the need to control the individual outweighs the risk of using the device. This includes:

- (a) Individuals who are known to be pregnant.
- (b) Elderly individuals or obvious juveniles.
- (c) Individuals with obviously low body mass.
- (d) Individuals who are handcuffed or otherwise restrained.
- (e) Individuals who have been recently sprayed with a flammable chemical agent or who are otherwise in close proximity to any known combustible vapor or flammable material, including alcohol-based oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray.
- (f) Individuals whose position or activity may result in collateral injury (e.g., falls from height, operating vehicles).

Because the application of the TASER device in the drive-stun mode (i.e., direct contact without probes) relies primarily on pain compliance, the use of the drive-stun mode generally should be limited to supplementing the probe-mode to complete the circuit, or as a distraction technique to gain separation between officers and the subject, thereby giving officers time and distance to consider other force options or actions.

The TASER device shall not be used to psychologically torment, elicit statements or to punish any individual.

#### 418 EMERGENCY DETENTIONS

##### 418.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines for when officers may place an individual under an emergency detention.

##### 418.3 AUTHORITY

An officer may take a person into emergency detention when either (RCW 71.05.150; RCW 71.05.153; RCW 71.05.201; RCW 71.34.710; Chapter 302, §67, Laws of 2020):

(a) There is reasonable cause to believe that a person is suffering from a behavioral health disorder (e.g., mental disorder, substance abuse disorder) and presents an imminent likelihood of serious harm, or is in imminent danger because of being gravely disabled

(b) The officer has received an order authorizing emergency detention from a court or a designated crisis responder

Persons taken into emergency detention should be transported to an appropriate facility as soon as practicable.

#### 418.4 CONSIDERATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Any officer handling a call involving an individual who may qualify for emergency detention should consider, as time and circumstances reasonably permit:

(a) Available information that might assist in determining the cause and nature of the individual's action or stated intentions.

(b) Community or neighborhood mediation services.

(c) Conflict resolution and de-escalation techniques.

(d) Community or other resources available to assist in dealing with behavioral health issues.

While these steps are encouraged, nothing in this section is intended to dissuade officers from taking reasonable action to ensure the safety of the officers and others. Emergency detentions should be preferred over arrest for individuals with behavioral health disorders who are suspected of committing minor crimes or creating other public safety issues.

#### 468 CIVIL DISPUTES

##### 468.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides members of the Issaquah Police Department with guidance for addressing conflicts between persons when no criminal investigation or enforcement action is warranted (e.g., civil matters), with the goal of minimizing any potential for violence or criminal acts. The Domestic Violence Policy will address specific legal mandates related to domestic violence court orders. References in this policy to "court orders" apply to any order of a court that does not require arrest or enforcement by the terms of the order or by Washington law.

##### 468.2 POLICY

The Issaquah Police Department recognizes that a law enforcement presence at a civil dispute can play an important role in the peace and safety of the community. Subject to available resources, members of this department will assist at the scene of civil disputes with the primary goal of safeguarding persons and property, preventing criminal activity and maintaining the peace.

When handling civil disputes, members will remain impartial, maintain a calm presence, give consideration to all sides and refrain from giving legal or inappropriate advice.

#### 468.3 GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS

When appropriate, members handling a civil dispute should encourage the involved parties to seek the assistance of resolution services or take the matter to the civil courts. Members must not become personally involved in disputes and shall at all times remain impartial.

While not intended to be an exhaustive list, members should give considerations to the following when handling civil disputes:

(a) Civil disputes tend to be confrontational and members should be alert that they can escalate to violence very quickly. De-escalation techniques should be used when appropriate.

(b) Members should not dismiss alleged or observed criminal violations as a civil matter and should initiate the appropriate investigation and report when criminal activity is apparent.

(c) Members shall not provide legal advice, however, when appropriate, members should inform the parties when they are at risk of violating criminal laws.

(d) Members are reminded that they shall not enter a residence or other non-public location without legal authority.

(e) Members should not take an unreasonable amount of time assisting in these matters and generally should contact a supervisor if it appears that peacekeeping efforts longer than 30 minutes are warranted.

#### 469 CRISIS INTERVENTION INCIDENTS

##### 469.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines for interacting with those who may be experiencing a mental health or emotional crisis. Interaction with such individuals has the potential for miscommunication and violence. It often requires an officer to make difficult judgments about a person's mental state and intent in order to effectively and legally interact with the individual.

##### 469.5 FIRST RESPONDERS

Safety is a priority for first responders. It is important to recognize that individuals under the influence of alcohol, drugs or both may exhibit symptoms that are similar to those of a person in a mental health crisis. These individuals may still present a serious threat to officers; such a threat should be addressed with reasonable tactics. Nothing in this policy shall be construed to limit an officer's authority to use reasonable force when interacting with a person in crisis. Officers are reminded that mental health issues, mental health crises and unusual behavior alone are not criminal offenses. Individuals may benefit from treatment as opposed to incarceration.

An officer responding to a call involving a person in crisis should:

- (a) Promptly assess the situation independent of reported information and make a preliminary determination regarding whether a mental health crisis may be a factor.
- (b) Request available backup officers and specialized resources as deemed necessary and, if it is reasonably believed that the person is in a crisis situation, use conflict resolution and de-escalation techniques to stabilize the incident as appropriate.
- (c) If feasible, and without compromising safety, turn off flashing lights, bright lights, or sirens.
- (d) Attempt to determine if weapons are present or available.
- (e) Take into account the person's mental and emotional state and potential inability to understand commands or to appreciate the consequences of his/her action or inaction, as perceived by the officer.
- (f) Secure the scene and clear the immediate area, as necessary.
- (g) Employ tactics to preserve the safety of all participants.
- (h) Determine the nature of any crime.
- (i) Request a supervisor, as warranted.
- (j) Evaluate any available information that might assist in determining cause or motivation for the person's actions or stated intentions.
- (k) If circumstances reasonably permit, consider and employ alternatives to force.

#### 469.6 DE-ESCALATION

Officers should consider that taking no action or passively monitoring the situation may be the most reasonable response to a mental health crisis.

Once it is determined that a situation is a mental health crisis and immediate safety concerns have been addressed, responding members should be aware of the following considerations and should generally:

- Evaluate safety conditions.
- Introduce themselves and attempt to obtain the person's name.
- Be patient, polite, calm, courteous and avoid overreacting.
- Speak and move slowly and in a non-threatening manner.
- Moderate the level of direct eye contact.
- Remove distractions or disruptive people from the area.

- Demonstrate active listening skills (e.g., summarize the person's verbal communication).
- Provide for sufficient avenues of retreat or escape should the situation become volatile.

Responding officers generally should not:

- Use stances or tactics that can be interpreted as aggressive.
- Allow others to interrupt or engage the person.
- Corner a person who is not believed to be armed, violent or suicidal.
- Argue, speak with a raised voice or use threats to obtain compliance.

### **Require Warning Before Shooting**

Policy 300.4 DEADLY FORCE APPLICATIONS outlines when deadly force is justified and includes a verbal warning when feasible.

Use of deadly force is justified in the following circumstances:

(a) An officer may use deadly force to protect him/herself or others from what he/she reasonably believes would be an imminent threat of death or serious bodily injury.

(b) An officer may use deadly force to stop a fleeing subject when the officer has probable cause to believe that the person has committed, or intends to commit, a felony involving the infliction or threatened infliction of serious bodily injury or death, and the officer reasonably believes that there is an imminent risk of serious bodily injury or death to any other person if the subject is not immediately apprehended. Under such circumstances, a verbal warning should precede the use of deadly force, where feasible. Imminent does not mean immediate or instantaneous. An imminent danger may exist even if the suspect is not at that very moment pointing a weapon at someone. For example, an imminent danger may exist if an officer reasonably believes any of the following:

1. The person has a weapon or is attempting to access one and it is reasonable to believe the person intends to use it against the officer or another.
2. The person is capable of causing serious bodily injury or death without a weapon and it is reasonable to believe the person intends to do so.

Additionally, several other policies require officers to give a warning prior to use of the tactic/tool:

### **308.3 ISSUING, CARRYING, AND USING CONTROL DEVICES**

Control devices described in this policy may be carried and used by members of this department only if the device has been issued by the department or approved by the Chief of Police or the authorized designee. Only officers who have successfully completed department-

approved training and have demonstrated satisfactory skill and proficiency in the use of any control device are authorized to carry and use the device.

Control devices may be used when a decision has been made to control, restrain, or arrest a subject who is violent or who demonstrates the intent to be violent, and the use of the device appears reasonable under the circumstances. When reasonable, a verbal warning and opportunity to comply should precede the use of these devices.

When using control devices, officers should carefully consider potential impact areas in order to minimize injuries and unintentional targets.

#### 308.10.2 DEPLOYMENT CONSIDERATIONS (KINETIC PROJECTILES)

Before discharging projectiles, the officer should consider such factors as:

- (a) Distance and angle to target.
- (b) Type of munitions employed.
- (c) Type and thickness of subject's clothing.
- (d) The subject's proximity to others.
- (e) The location of the subject.
- (f) Whether the subject's actions dictate the need for an immediate response and the use of control devices appears appropriate.

A verbal warning of the intended use of the device should precede its application, unless it would otherwise endanger the safety of officers or when it is not practicable due to the circumstances. The purpose of the warning is to give the individual a reasonable opportunity to voluntarily comply and to warn other officers and individuals that the device is being deployed.

#### 309.4 VERBAL AND VISUAL WARNINGS (TASER)

A verbal warning of the intended use of the TASER device should precede its application, unless it would otherwise endanger the safety of officers or when it is not practicable due to the circumstances. The purpose of the warning is to:

- (a) Provide the individual with a reasonable opportunity to voluntarily comply.
- (b) Provide other officers and individuals with a warning that the TASER device may be deployed.

### **Duty to Intervene**

Policy 300.2.1 DUTY TO INTERCEDE states any officer present and observing another officer using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force. An officer

who observes another employee use force that exceeds the degree of force permitted by law should promptly report these observations to a supervisor.

### **Ban Shooting at Moving Vehicles**

Policy 300.4.1 SHOOTING AT OR FROM MOVING VEHICLES does not ban shooting at moving vehicles. The policy directs officers to move out of the path of an oncoming vehicle, and states “An officer should only discharge a firearm at a moving vehicle or its occupants when the officer reasonably believes there are no other reasonable means available to avert the threat of the vehicle, or if deadly force other than the vehicle is directed at the officer or others.” This is trained as an officer should only shoot if deadly force is justified, not simply the vehicle is driving at the officer. Additionally, the policy clarifies that officers should not shoot at any part of a vehicle in an attempt to disable the vehicle.

### **Require Comprehensive Reporting**

Per IPD policy 300.5 Reporting the Use of Force, the Issaquah Police Department reviews each use of force incident immediately and 300.9 Use of Force Analysis as part of an annual department use of force review. Use of Force is defined as the application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents or weapons to another person. It is not a use of force when a person allows him/herself to be searched, escorted, handcuffed or restrained.

After an incident, the on-duty supervisor reviews the incident, attempts to interview the subject that force was used on, and documents the information in the case report. This case report is then forwarded to the corresponding Commander for review against policies and procedures, and then forwarded to the Chief of Police for final review. During this process, each incident is added to a tracking spreadsheet documenting the circumstances of each incident. Additionally, each year all use of force incidents are reviewed for any trends, training needs, equipment needs and policy revisions.



**Ban Chokeholds**: Policy 300 Use of Force -Our department does not allow or train for the use of these techniques.



**Require Warning**: Policy 300.4 – Requires verbal warning, when feasible, when using deadly force.

Other policies related to less lethal force also require warnings prior to application of force.



**Ban Shooting at Vehicles**: Policy 300.4.1 – Policy does not outright ban shooting at moving vehicles. Policy allows for very narrow application.



**Require De-escalation:** Policy 300 Use of Force, Policy 308 Control Devices and Techniques, Policy 309 Conducted Energy Device, Policy 418 Emergency Detentions, Policy 468 Civil Disputes, Policy 469 Crisis Intervention Incidents



**Require Use of Force Continuum:** Policy 300 Use of Force, Policy 308 Control Devices and Techniques, Policy 309 Conducted Energy Device, Policy 418 Emergency Detentions, Policy 468 Civil Disputes, Policy 469 Crisis Intervention Incidents



**Require Exhaust All Alternatives Before Shooting:** Policy 300 Use of Force, Policy 308 Control Devices and Techniques, Policy 309 Conducted Energy Device, Policy 418 Emergency Detentions, Policy 468 Civil Disputes, Policy 469 Crisis Intervention Incidents



**Duty to Intervene:** Policy 300.2.1 Duty to Intercede requires an officer to intervene when observing another officer using force that is beyond what is objectively reasonable.



**Require Comprehensive Reporting:** Policy 300.5 Reporting the Use of Force requires reporting and review of each use of force by department employee.

Policy 300.9 Use of Force Analysis requires annual review.

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
